The young leaders Discovered the wild place that is Dartmoor and Explored it - in ways they didn't think possible!



They took thier enthusiasm for Conservation back to London and worked with the young people to help restore green spaces around Providence House. They then Shared their experinces with the young people they serve.

They have all received their beautiful certificates and The Shallowford Trust is now a recognised Provider of the John Muir Award. Congratulations to everyone.

Thank you to them and indeed all our trustees who work very hard for the trust, especially at this time of change and development.


Night Walks
